

Clinician Awareness Program—Fire Service

OVERVIEW (DAY ONE):

This workshop is designed for masters and doctoral level licensed mental health clinicians who are interested in providing mental health services (consultation, crisis intervention, evidence-based treatments) to firefighters and paramedics/emergency medical technicians. The course will provide intermediate training in firefighter culture, the effects of chronic occupational exposure to trauma on the physical and mental health of firefighters, efficacious treatments, and the clinician's role as a mental health professional for first responders. Didactic material will be augmented by videos of firefighters discussing various aspects of their job, culture, and challenges.

The content of this training focuses on the application of empirically supported psychological assessment and intervention methods as they are applied to the unique population of first responders. The content is drawn from the peer-reviewed literature on trauma and its aftermath as applied to first responders, in particular, those in the fire service.

Total Time (Day One): 7 hours, APA CE Credit Available

Target CE Audience: Masters and doctoral level mental health clinicians.

Cost: This two day course costs \$250.

OBJECTIVES (DAY ONE):

After completing this course participants will be able to:

- Describe the nature of trauma, risk factors for developing psychological disorders in the aftermath of trauma, and the natural course of recovery.
- List the specific mental health concerns that firefighters experience.
- Recognize culturally appropriate language and terms.
- Discuss how work schedules and occupational dangers of the profession precipitate additional stress.
- Identify efficacious treatments for trauma that have been demonstrated to have efficacy.

Deborah Beidel, Ph.D., ABPP

Deborah C. Beidel, Ph.D., ABPP is Trustee Chair and Pegasus Professor of Psychology and Medical Education and Director of UCF RESTORES at the University of Central Florida. Internationally recognized as a leader in the area of traumatic stress, her use of virtual reality to treat people suffering from PTSD has led to the development of treatments that are 2 to 3 times more effective than standard treatments. Dr. Beidel is the author of over 300 scientific publications including journal articles, book chapters, and books on the treatment of anxiety disorders and posttraumatic stress disorder. She has received over \$31 million dollars in federal research funding, developing effective treatments for anxiety and PTSD and then disseminating them into standard clinical practice. Her most recent work has involved leading a team of scientists and clinicians to develop a new virtual reality system that allows clinicians to more easily use virtual reality to treat veterans, active-duty personnel, first responders, and survivors of mass shootings with PTSD.

You will experience what it is like to wear bunker gear, (mask, air tank, gloves, boots, and hood.) You will then be put through 2-3 fire scenarios. Example scenarios include a search and rescue, watch live burns, and an EMS scenario, which might include performing CPR. Additionally, you will visit a fire house to discuss various topics in different rooms of the fire station.



After completion of both days of the course, and 10 hours of ride along with a fire department, clinicians will qualify to register on redlinerescue.org, a website matching clinicians with fire service personnel seeking behavioral health services.

Rob has been serving the Safety & Training division since 2017 and is the Peer Support Team Coordinator. Rob was also named the 2020 Fire Officer of the Year for his department. He holds many certifications through the State of Florida including Instructor, Live Training Instructor, Incident Safety Officer, Public Information Officer, and Fire Officer 2. Rob has always been an advocate for behavioral health and mental wellness and was instrumental in developing the behavioral health program as well as the Peer Support Team in St. Petersburg and even extending to other nearby agencies.
